Team Up, Speak Up, Fire Up!

Current research, authentic examples of best practices, and voices from the field can champion the power of purposeful collaboration and provide educators with resources that will empower them to support English learners (ELs) and their families. Guided by four core principles (common purpose, shared mindset, diverse team membership, supportive environment), this keynote will explain how to meet the challenges of collaborating with ELs and help all stakeholders--administrators, teachers, students, parents, community leaders--develop new and effective ways of working together for the success of each learner by Teaming Up, Speaking Up, and Firing Up!

Biography

Maria Dove, Ed.D, is Professor in the School of Education and Human Services at Molloy College, Rockville Centre, New York. She teaches pre-service and in-service teachers about the research and best practices for developing effective programs and school policies for English learners and guides doctoral students in the Ed.D program in leadership for social justice and equity. Before entering the field of higher education, she worked for over thirty years as an English-as-a-second-language teacher in public school settings (Grades K–12) and in adult English language programs in Nassau County, New York.

Dr. Dove frequently provides professional development for educators throughout the United States on the teaching of diverse students. She also serves as a mentor for new ESOL teachers as well as an instructional coach for general-education teachers and literacy specialists. She has published a number of articles, book chapters, and books on collaborative teaching practices, instructional leadership, and instructional strategies for diverse learners. With Andrea Honigsfeld, she co-authored five best-selling Corwin books, *Collaboration and Co-Teaching: Strategies for English Learners* (2010), *Common Core for the Not-So-Common Learner, Grades K–5: English Language Arts Strategies* (2013), and *Common Core for the Not-So-Common Learner, Grades 6–12: English Language Arts Strategies* (2013), *Collaboration and Co-Teaching: A Leader's Guide* (2015), *Coteaching for English Learners: A Guide to Collaborative Planning, Instruction, Assessment, and Reflection* (2018).
